Registration Details:

Registration will take place in the Panorama Room between 12.00 and 14.00 on the Friday. Accommodation:

Unfortunately there is no accommodation available on campus, however a special conference rate has been negotiated with the Falcoln Hotel, Manor Road, Coventry (Tel 0203 258615). An ensuite room with preakfast costs £22 per person, per night if you book for at least two nights. The Hotel is near the station. Other B&B addresses can be obtained from the CRPL at the address below. For those with cars and coming in a group, it may be worth trying the Campanile Hotel (0203 639922) as they make a flat charge per room!

Food:

The Students' Union has several food outlets and an all day bar. Prices are reasonable. The Staff Club has been booked for the duration of the conference and the bar will be open there at lunch and dinner times. No refreshments are included in the registration cost.

Travel:

By train: to Coventry BR. Then catch the 12, 12A or X12 bus to the University from the bus stop on the bridge over the railway lines. Fare is 58p at weekends and during off peak. Buses do not give change.

By coach: to Coventry Coach Park. Then catch above listed buses to University from Pool Meadow Bus station next door, under subway. Fare as above.

By car: the University is signposted off the A45 and A46. There are plenty of car parks, but beware, some are not free and clamping is rife.
